

THE MEDICAL SOCIETIES. The Medical Society of London held its first meeting on the 11th, when a very able and suggestive paper by the President, Dr. CHOWNE, was read, showing the effect of artificial heat in such cities as London in raising the temperature five and six degrees some nights as compared to the suburbs. At the Hunterian Society, a very instructive paper has been read by Mr. Hutchinson, on the contamination of the mother by the fetus *in utero*; and at the Abernethian Society, Mr. Holmes Coote has given a detail of the proceedings of the hospitals in the East.

SOCIETY FOR RELIEF OF WIDOWS AND ORPHANS OF MEDICAL MEN IN LONDON AND ITS VICINITY. A general meeting of the members of this Society took place on Wednesday last, the 8th instant, when the proceedings of the directors during the past six months were read. It appeared that grants for the past half-year had been made to 33 widows and 25 children to the extent of £801:10, besides £30 in extra grants. The legacy of £100, bequeathed by Sir Benj. Outram, M.D., C.B., had been received.
