Arguments continue in the national press about the sincerity of Britain's participation in the European community. John Griffin (p 312) shows how poorly the directives have worked for drug regulation, though new proposals may influence things. Another threat of harmonisation is cheaper cigarettes in the UK, so that the finding by Godfrey and Maynard (p 339) of the close link between price and demand is timely, particularly given their view that the effects on

employment and taxation revenue could be offset. No week seems complete now without contributions on AIDS and HIV testing, and the battles on testing started at the two last ARMs continue in the correspondence columns (p 356), with John Bancroft's editorial (p 308) arguing that in deciding their attitude towards homosexuality doctors should at least avoid the past error of obscuring moral values behind pseudomedical science.
