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EDITOR'S CHOICE



One of the recent medical success stories, the advances in genetics, is well illustrated in two of this week's articles. Pijpers and his colleagues from The Netherlands (p 822) show how valuable and safe transabdominal chorionic villus biopsy may be in later pregnancy—in the second and third trimesters. They detected abnormal fetal karyotypes in seven cases, enabling termination in six, while (apart from one unexplained fetal death) the remaining pregnancies continued normally. Nearer home the Cardiff medical genetics unit (p 843) emphasises the explosive developments. When their DNA diagnostic group

began the haemoglobinopathies were the only conditions for which molecular genetics diagnosis had been established; now they list no fewer than 42 conditions. And Cotter and Nasipuri from Barts (p 856) show how DNA probes may be useful in showing progression of tumours when conventional studies have failed. Finally, there is the battle of the bottles: one sort (breast versus artificial feeding) continues in the correspondence columns (p 856); another type (how many excess deaths from alcohol) possibly begins with Anderson's conclusion of an estimated figure of 28 000 (p 824). We haven't heard the last of either.
