EDITOR'S CHOICE



We shall have to wait a little before we can look at the medical lessons learnt at this week's tragic air crash near the M1 and East Midlands airport. By all accounts the medical care was exemplary, but probably similar psychological problems will arise in the rescue workers and relatives as they did in last year's Lockerbie disaster (p 127). The debate about the management of major injuries from other causes, particularly road accidents, goes on with the role of special units, district general hospitals, and immediate care all being emphasised (pp 115-6). At least in the West disaster relief is not plagued by politics, as it may be in the Third World (p 116). Elsewhere in

this week's BMJ two other types of violence are featured—the ritualised form of boxing, often called a sport and so well portrayed by George Bellaus's paintings on show at several American galleries (p 105), and the assaults on general practitioners and their staff (p 63 and p 97). It takes a historian to put all this into perspective, and Professor R J Evans reminds us in his book review that under the ancien régime in France licences to practise medicine were given not only to university trained physicians and barber surgeons but also to bone setters, herbalists, apothecaries, monks, and even executioners (p 129).
